To the Saints

"Go, and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. And teaching them to observe all whatsoever I have commanded you. And behold, I am with you always to the end of the ages." (Matt. 28:19-20)

e have titled this verse as "The Great Commission." But it really isn't the great commission. Jesus gives his last words to his disciples before he ascends into heaven to take his seat at the right hand of the Father.

October 8 is "Mission Sunday" at Emmanuel at 10:00 a.m., and there may or may not be some reference to this verse. However well intentioned, we use these words from Jesus to guilt people into getting out there in the community and knocking on doors, and doing surveys, and placing door hangers on the homes in a neighborhood that is affluent or close. Seldom do we commit to such ventures without some ulterior motive, be it to get more people into the pews, or more money from those who might visit, or even just the warm feeling that we are doing something good for God.

I was reminded yet again, during the Bible study on the 14th, that Martin Luther began questioning the practices of the church because he naively thought that he could change the unscriptural practices of the church. Sometime between the posting of the 95 Theses on October 31, 1517, and his writing of the Heidelberg Disputation shortly before May of 1518, something changed in Luther that brought about a difference in his focus of the things he wrote and the way he spoke.

Whatever happened is seen in the passion Luther has for the salvation of the people, including, even, the Pope and the cardinals of the Catholic Church. The believer is consumed with the passion for the salvation of the people, including, even those who are your enemies because of the work of the Holy Spirit that is given in Holy Baptism. Baptism is actually your great commission and mine.

Jesus has already died for the sins of the world. Jesus has already been raised from the dead for the justification of the world. Jesus is now ascending to the Father, so that the holy Spirit may be sent into the world to create and sustain true faith in the hearts of God's people, you and I. We cannot be commanded to do the work of God any more than we can be commanded to believe in Jesus as our Savior.

Luther wrote on September 6, 1520, in his treatise on the Freedom of the Christian, 'A Christian is a perfectly free lord of all, subject to none. A Christian is a perfectly dutiful servant of all, subject to all.' (LW, vol.31, p. 344)

Later on in the treatise, Luther clarifies what this means when he writes, 'Love is true and genuine where there is true and genuine faith ...

'We conclude, therefore, that a Christian lives not to himself, but in Christ and in his neighbor. Otherwise he is not a Christian. He lives in Christ through faith in his neighbor through love.' (p. 371)

What does it mean to be a Christian? First; we believe that we are a sinner for whom Christ died, and second; we share our good news, and we do good works without thinking, before being asked. Just doing, without even considering who may or may not believe as we do. Just sharing God's forgiveness, the Good News, with others all the time, everywhere. You are saved on account of Christ. Being a Christian is nothing more and nothing less.




