To the Saints

Oh Lord, make me know my end and what is the measure of my days; let me know how fleeting I am! (Psalm 39: In the Name of Jesus. Amen)

hen my wife and I had our first child, we received all sorts of advice. Some advice we asked for, some we didn't. People are funny that way. They like to give advice as if to bring meaning to their experiences, but I realize something now as my first child turns five and is preparing kindergarten: they were right. The advice we often received was, "Don't blink; they grow up fast," and they were right. I wonder now if their desire to give advice came from a place of regret or grief. They blinked, and their children were grown, just like I blinked and my oldest prepares for Kindergarten. The psalmist gives words to this. God shows us in many ways how short our lives are, how quickly time passes, and how soon death approaches. One thing is certain: regardless of how old you are, dear reader, life is fleeting. While it seems like this is simply a reality you must face, it can serve a greater purpose in the life of the Christian. Allow it to be a call to you, a call to repent and to turn back to the Father who loves you. Why? Because all sinners have the propensity to get distracted and caught up in trivial things. Time is wasted on reading news articles about Fantasy Football, hours slip by while you scroll on your phone to look into people's lives whom you do not know, and days drift away while you attend your children's tournaments that consume their entire childhood. The list goes on. We waste a lot of time on trivial things. There is this sense that there is time for the important things, but right now isn't that time. There is time to hear God's word, but it can wait for now. There is time to receive His Gifts, but it isn't today. There is time to confess Jesus as Lord, but not until you're older and death is more real.

Don't be a fool. Life is truly fleeting. Life is short. God is near. Do not waste time on triviathings. Don't misunderstand what I am saying: it is okay to play some sports, enjoy some entertainment, and even play some Fantasy Football, but don't let it consume you. Don't let it become your god. Carve out time in your life for the more pressing things. Do not put God in the "to be done later" pile of things on your schedule. Honor the Sabbath by going to church to rest in His care and receive the Good News of Jesus dead, resurrected, and ascended for you. Rest in the presence of God and His mercy. Feed on his word day after day. A day will come (if it hasn't already) when God will remind you that your life is truly fleeting, and on that day, you will cry out to the Lord, and He will answer. His answer is in Christ, the crucified one. He will hear you. And He will speak words of comfort and life to you. For in Him, life is not fleeting; it is everlasting.

Dear Friends

So, it's been a while since my last update.

We are now in a cabin we have rented in Michigan's Upper Peninsula where we are about three hours from Aaron. We will be here for Aaron's first year of university, and then plan to head back to Botswana. We are enjoying the beauty and solitude of the North Woods, though we have only just had our first snow and some of us are already dreaming of warmer climes.

Since my last update Tim has gone back to Botswana to see how the Khwedam translation is progressing and to do consultant checking with the Wayeyi translation team. Tim first went home to see what was happening in our area. The visit with Splash was somewhat frustrating due to computer issues (Splash needs a new one) and Splash being pulled away for this and that, but Tim and Splash were able to get together to talk over what is going on in the community and what steps should take place going forward. Tim also spent a good bit of time with him going over his translation of Luke and training him on how to use some of the features of our translation software for checking. Overall, it was a good visit with Splash.

While at home Tim also dealt with a rather massive termite invasion of our kitchen. Apparently, a month ago termites went on a rampage, not just at our home but all over the area. Fortunately our home is cement brick, so there is no structural damage, but Tim couldn't believe our kitchen cabinets; some of them had holes where things sitting on the shelves had fallen through, and others literally disintegrated as he touched them. Fortunately he was able to remove our freezer's solar batteries from their precarious perch before they - or their wiring -got damaged by falling. He also removed the sink before it fell and broke the pipes and he replaced what was left of the wooden cupboard with a steel frame. While the cupboards are a pain to deal with and will require some work when we get back to Botswana, we are very grateful it wasn't worse.

After a week at our place Tim went down to where we usually get supplies to do some consultant checking with the Wayeyi translation team. The team has translated the whole book of Luke, so that is what Tim checked with them. The team is a joy to work with; they worked very diligently and they got a lot accomplished; completing the first nine chapters of the book. Tim said that the days were long and people were pretty brain-dead by the end of the day, but they were very

happy with the progress they made. The team now needs to back-translate the rest of Luke (which is what consultants use as a start for doing their checking), so hopefully they will get that done before Tim's next trip which is scheduled for February.

Otherwise, we continue to wait to hear word on the printing of the Khwedam panoramic Bible. Whenever we have asked, we have been assured it is with the printer in South Korea; we have to assume it is either in the queue to be printed or is actually being printed.

Praises:

- Thanksgiving that there is progress towards getting the Khwedam Panoramic Bible printed.
- Thanksgiving for smooth and uneventful travel for Tim to Botswana, and for good meetings while there.
- Thanksgiving that Aaron is settling in well at university.

Prayers:

- * Please pray that the Khwedam Panoramic Bible will be printed soon.
- * Please pray for Splash and Moronga to work steadily on their translations of Luke and Mark, respectively.
- * Please pray for the Khwedam Community to plan well for dedication of their Bible.
