he saying is, "home is where the heart is."

So, if home is where the heart is, where is home for your heart? Perhaps, most of the time, when we think about home, we think about home as the place where there is security, the place we grew up in, the place of only the "good" memories and none of the "bad". Jerry Apps on PBS brings that to the forefront with his ability to tell stories of yesteryear, bringing the sights and sounds, tastes and smells of our home back in vivid detail. Many of those are my memories of my home, kind of. They may be your memories as well, but they may not be the home where your children's heart is. One of the sounds in the home is the music that evokes feelings in us of those memories. For one person it is the music of rock-n-roll, for another it is jazz, or country and western, or hip hop. For most of you, "Home" may be the song of nostalgia. The song "Home" was written by Michael Buble' which came out about 20 years ago. Tabor Council Meeting March 14 4:30 p.m. **Attendees**: Dan Felker, Scott Tennant, John Francis, Gary Kebschull, Janet Strohbusch Pastor Stoll, and Sonia Schultz

Call to Order

The meeting held on March 14, 2025, was called to order by President Dan Felker, with attendance confirmed. Trustees also affirmed that the defibrillator had undergone its scheduled testing.

Approval of the Agenda

The agenda was unanimously approved following a motion by Dan Felker and seconded by Janet Strobusch. No additional edits or changes were noted.

Opening Devotions

Pastor Stoll led the opening devotion.

Minutes from 2/14/2025 Meeting

The minutes from the February 14, 2025 meeting were reviewed, and no edits were required. A motion to approve them was made by John Francis and seconded by Janet Strobusch, carrying unanimously.

Treasurer's Report

The Treasurer's Report confirmed sufficient funds to cover bills. It was noted that special funds, including four CDs, were up for renewal with a current rate of 4%. A motion to renew the CDs for one year was made by Scott Tennant, seconded by Gary Kebschull, and approved unanimously. Insurance costs were also discussed, with John Francis providing relevant information to address earlier inquiries.

Pastor's Report

Pastor Stoll shared updates on congregational care, including individuals recovering from surgery or illness and others needing prayers for various struggles. Catechism classes missed earlier in the year would be made up with additional weekly sessions through the end of the term. Pastor announced he would be away for his grandson's confirmation on May 4, 2025, with Pastor Hahn substituting. He also informed the council of plans for absence on June 8 and June 15, 2025. The report and its updates were approved following a motion by Janet Strobusch and seconded by Sonja Schultz.

Ushers' Report

No new ushers were confirmed, and the existing list showed Arne Bubolz requesting removal. Scott Tennant volunteered to assist.

Old Business

Janet Strobusch reported satisfaction with the cleaning services, though concerns were raised about specific doors being left unlatched or unlocked. Measures to address these issues were discussed. Regarding the parsonage basement water issue, it was noted that no further water was detected after recent rainfall, and efforts would continue after the ground thaws. Scott Tennant confirmed the parsonage furnace repair was completed and functioning correctly. Membership discussions revealed that 154 members were recorded, though Pastor anticipated a decrease based on current trends. The council also agreed to reorder 50 sets of giving envelopes for the congregation.

Short-Term Project List

The thermostat recalibration near the furnace room had been completed and paid for. Snow removal from the roof was deemed unnecessary after inspections by Nick Miller.

New Business

The decision to change property inspections from twice a year to once annually was rescinded, as bylaws require the original schedule and Synod approval for such changes. Pastor shared a request from Oconto County Health and Human Services for donation supplies for foster families and older adults, which the council approved as a one-time drive. A recent issue with a frozen pipe leading to the holding tank was resolved at no cost, and measures were proposed to prevent similar problems in the future. Communication for church closures was addressed, with a plan to notify members via an updated outgoing voice mail message and a sign in the narthex advising members to call the church if concerned about weather conditions. Feedback from the Ladies Aid highlighted their planned events, including a Spring LWML Rally, an Easter breakfast, and a Fall LWML Rally.

Comments and Announcements

Emmanuel announced a rummage and bake sale scheduled for late April. Upcoming duties for April included Dan Felker serving as Elder on call and an Elder meeting on March 23, 2025, at Emmanuel.

Next Council Meeting

The next council meeting was scheduled for April 11, 2025, at 4:30 p.m.

Adjournment and Closing Prayer

The meeting adjourned following a motion by Dan Felker, seconded by Scott Tennant, and supported by Janet Strobusch. Pastor Stoll concluded the meeting with a closing prayer.
