To the Saints

July 2025

"And on the seventh day God finished his work that he had done, and he rested on the seventh day from all his work that he had done. So God blessed the seventh day and made it holy, because on it God rested from all his work that he had done in creation." (Genesis 2:2-3)

It is the middle of Summer. July 4 is our day of independence as a nation, but most people treat it (summer) as independence from worship. We take our vacations to resort areas, to the mountains, to the lakes, or maybe just to see family in another part of the country. Taking time to rest and recuperate from job stress, school stress, family stress is not a bad thing. It becomes a bad thing when we vacate everything in our life, especially weekly worship and daily devotion. And yet it is this very thing that God gives to us so that we are able to rest and recuperate. It is called "sabbath". On the seventh day God rests because his creative work was completed, not because he was weary.

God creates (sets aside)—or makes holy the Sabbath. In the Old Testament, Saturday is the rest day or Sabbath. When Christ fulfilled the whole law (Matt. 5:17), he liberated the people of Israel in the O.T. All days belong equally to God, they always have. Nevertheless, faith in Christ moves God's people to respond to his grace in worship: to hear His Word, to receive His gifts in the sacraments to praise him and give thanks to him for His mighty works, and to call upon Him in prayer. Such worship is the constant response of faith to God's grace. Because God has called us Christians together into one body, the church, through which he gives His gifts of Word and Sacrament, it is proper for us to gather together to worship Him and to receive the very gifts he offers. Sunday symbolically represents the first day of the new rest into which God's people have been called in Christ. This is sometimes known as the eighth day) because on it Christ rose from the dead establishing the restoration of all creation on the day of resurrection.

How often, when you go on vacation, do you skip church? I realize that sometimes there is not an LCMS congregation nearby (but we all know that is just an excuse). We just don't feel like getting up and going. When we do we miss the opportunity to receive the rest God desires for us to have: to hear his Word of forgiveness, to hear the word of Christ's love for his people, to sing the hymns of praise and pray the prayers and petitions for those we love and those we don't even know, but who are brothers and sisters nonetheless. We also miss the fellowship and the joy of believers who need us as much as we need them for encouragement and hope.

When you take your vacation(s) this year take some time to find out where the LCMS congregations are and worship with people you don't know. Rest with them in the Lord and in the bosom of his grace. You might just enjoy it more than you think and be more rested than you can imagine.

Tabor Council Meeting June 13, 2025

Call to Order: The meeting was called to order by Dan Felker, with attendees including John Francis, Scott Tennant, Janet Strohbusch, Gary Kebschull, and Sonja Schultz. Scott reported that the defibrillator installation was completed. The agenda was approved Motioned by Janet, and 2nd by Gary.

Opening Devotion: Due to the pastor being on vacation, the opening devotion was led by Dan Felker.

Meeting Minutes: John noted that Pastor Haag's name needed correction in the minutes, and Scott and Janet seconded the motion, which carried unanimously.

Treasurer's Report: John reported that May income was trending downward, leading to discussions on how to meet budget goals. Motion to approve by Janet and Gary seconded the motion, and it was carried unanimously.

Pastor's Report: Dan Felker provided updates on behalf of Pastor Stoll, that there were no baptisms, one confirmation at Tabor, and no funerals. The Mission Festival is scheduled for October 5, 2025, at Tabor, with Steinhaus as the presenter. The District Convention was held on June 1-2. The elders did not meet in May due to illness, and their next meeting is planned for June 22 or 29, with some uncertainty about the final date. Motion to approve by Gary and Sonja seconded the motion, which carried unanimously.

Usher's Report: No report was given.

Old Business: Parsonage Basement Water: Scott noted that a friend of Rick Gipp is still willing to assist in assessing the issue. There is uncertainty regarding whether a drain tile exists on the north wall, and Pastor was unavailable to discuss concerns about the recent rain.

Dispose of Accordion Divider: Janet confirmed that the accordion divider has been removed from the build-ing.

Follow-up on Guest Pastor with the Mic: John discussed defining the home for the microphone, noting that its batteries do not last through two full services. The microphone should be kept in the side room by the speaker, and a 9V battery should be stored there as well. Guest Pastor Readings Setup: John noted that the guest pastor mentioned that the readings had not been set up.

Pastor's Vacation Coverage: Dan Felker proposed that the on-call information should be included in the bulletin.

Short-Term Project List: John highlighted the need to discuss details for the Mission Festival on October 5, 2025, to ensure proper planning.

New Business: Janet announced that the Lutheran Ladies Aid LWML Fall Rally will be held at Tabor on October 11, 2025, and is open to all members. Assistance will be needed, with an expected attendance of 50-60 people, and a planning meeting will take place in July. The dual church picnic will be hosted at Emmanuel this year. The Brat Fry, originally scheduled for June 13, was canceled due to rain, and efforts will be made to reschedule. There were also discussions about updating the highway sign in the future.

Next Council Meeting: The next meeting is scheduled for July 11 at 4:30 p.m.

Comments and Announcements: John made a motion to discuss future planning with the pastor, leading to conversations about church goals, but no formal vote was taken.

Elder on Call: The schedule for elders on call was set, with Dan Felker covering July, Scott covering August, and Gary covering September.

Adjournment: The meeting was adjourned following a motion by Dan Felker, seconded by Scott and Janet, which was carried unanimously.
