he person who does not pray knows neither his desperate need nor the benefit of praying. Although teaching people the language of prayer is indeed a good thing, still there is a sense in which prayer must be totally untaught and absolutely spontaneous. As new beings re-created after the Spirit, prayer should well up within us with artesian insistence (Jn 7:38). Unfortunately, spontaneity is often the excuse for lethargy. Prayer that must be spontaneous is often left unsaid because our flesh masters spontaneity.

To encourage prayer, God has attached great and precious promises to prayer. He promises to listen to us and see to our needs. However, we are also driven to prayer by the trouble we see in the world and feel in our own hearts. There is no end of things for which we should be praying. For the devil prowls around constantly seeking whom he may devour. Praying for rescue from the

devil could occupy endless hours, plaguing Satan and glorifying God. Think of all those offices of divine governance in the world? We should pray for the President, Congress, the Supreme Court, state legislators, the Governor of our state, our mayor, the military, police and firefighters, rescue workers, doctors and nurses, and the like. We should ray for the faithful and successful execution of their duties and for their safety in the midst of many troubles and trials.

Most Christians have had the experience that they only pray earnestly when great trouble comes their way. This happens perhaps when a loved one becomes gravely ill. As many hours are spent in anxious waiting and watching at the sickbed of a spouse, parent, or child, heartfelt prayers ascend assailing heaven, demanding of God that He fulfill his gracious promises

to us his children. This is truly taking heaven by storm and is welcomed by our heavenly Father (Mt 11:12). There is so much to pray for and so much benefit in praying, we can never think of ourselves as having finished praying. Lord, teach us to pray!

Luther writes this, "Where there is true prayer there must be earnestness. We must feel our need, the distress that impels and drives us to cry out. Then prayer will come spontaneously, as it should, and we shall not need to be taught how to prepare for it or how

to generate devotion. The need which ought to be the concern of both ourselves and others is quite amply indicated in the Lord's Prayer. Therefore, it may serve to remind us and impress on us not to neglect praying. We all have needs enough, but the trouble is that we do not feel or see them. God, therefore, wishes you to lament and express your needs and wants, not because he is unaware of them, but in order that you

may kindle your heart to stronger and greater desires and spread your cloak wide to receive many things. "Each of us should form the habit form his youth to pray daily for all his needs, whenever he is aware of anything that affects him or other people around him, such as preachers, magistrates, neighbors, servants; and, as we have said, he should always remind God of His commandment and promise, knowing that He will not have them despised. This I say because I would like to see people brought again to pray rightly and not act so crudely and coldly that they become daily more inept at praying. This is just what the devil wants and works for with all his might for he is well aware what damage and harm he suffers when prayer is in proper use."


Dear Friends

Greetings once again from hot and sunny Botswana.

Life continues to be interesting. Since my last update, Aaron left to go back to school at Michigan Tech and has settled in there again very well. Classes don't seem to be too much of a problem for him, and he is once again involved with Bible Studies and with events at Concordia House, the house the local LCMS church has right near campus which hosts events and offers rides to church on Sundays. It is strange being in Botswana without Aaron, we miss him. Andrew is currently finishing up his senior year of high school at home, spending some time making knives, and also continuing to learn the Irish flute and Ullian pipes (Irish bagpipes). He and Tim now provide quite a bit of the music for our Sunday worship, and have also given a few 'concerts' for tourists at the nearby camping lodge.

Burning season is upon us again, so I (Lisa) have temporarily moved to the town where we get supplies to get away from that. Thank goodness Andrew is as independent as he is; he does his school work and we go over his history and literature questions by phone. Tim got back about a week ago from a 10-day trip to Sierra Leone where he worked with the Themne translation

team to do the final check on the first fifteen chapters of 1 Kings. Tim really enjoys the guys in this team, who happen to all be pastors, and enjoys the thoughtful discussions they have as they work through the passages to make sure they are both clear and faithful to the original. He also got to enjoy a lot of rain while in Sierra Leone -- which



made me jealous; we haven't had any rain here since we arrived back in Botswana in May.

October promises to be more of the same for all of us. Tim is planning to come down to the town where I am in about three weeks to do some consultant checking with the Wayeyi translation team on the book of John. Andrew is planning on coming with Tim, and while Tim works with the translators Andrew wants to work at a friend's restaurant where he hope to pick up some recipes and good kitchen tips. I am looking forward to all three of us being in the same town again, at least for a little while.

Tim continues to help Splash with the planning of the November dedication for the Khwedam panoramic Bible, though Splash is the one in charge. Please pray for Splash; that is a lot of planning and responsibility riding on his shoulders, and things are not going smoothly for him.

Tabor Council Meeting (October 10, 2025) **Call to Order**: The meeting was called to order by Orv Quandt, with Pastor, Scott Tennant, Janet Strobusch, and Gary Kebschull present. It was noted that the defibrillator had been successfully checked.

Approval of the Agenda: Orv Quandt proposed the agenda with an addition under New Business to include envelopes and a personal note. The motion was seconded by Sonja and Scott and carried unanimously.

Opening Devotion: Pastor led the opening devotion.

Minutes Approval: Orv Quandt moved to approve the previous meeting's minutes. The motion was seconded by Gary and Janet and passed unanimously.

Treasurer's Report: Janet presented the Treasurer's Report, addressing a voided check that appeared to have been canceled before leaving the account. Last Sunday's offering deposit remains locked in the safe, and Orv will deliver it to Dennis and Sandy for counting. The report was approved with outstanding questions, seconded by Sonja, and carried unanimously.

Pastor's Report: There were no baptisms and two funerals for Emmanuel. Catechism began with one student, focusing on daily faith practices. A circuit forum was held to elect a Pastoral Delegate for the national convention, with expenses covered. Synod assess-

ments will be sent in Jan/Feb based on baptized membership. All circuit churches will contribute to the convention account for travel to St. Louis. Pastor Nehring from White Lake is the alternate delegate. A vote for Synod President will occur in June. Pastor also completed multiple wellness visits.
