Little Mary sank exhausted upon a bed of straw cradling the Child to her breast. She dozed, as she often did, pondering in her heart of a woman exhausted by the visit of strangers and full of the joy at the appearing of God-with-us, she became aware of a rustling of leaves stirred by a chilling wind from the east. Shivering, her first thought was of her swaddled boy and looking upon Him, she could see that His infant eyes were not upon her, but riveted upon the low entry of the peasant's hut in which they sheltered.

Brittle leaves, decomposing signs of life fled from the world, scuttled into the hut spinning in dusty eddies of death about the feet of a decrepit old woman, as thought the wind borne carpet of leaves conveyed the crone into the hut. Mary became aware that the Child knew her and that she knew what she sought in the hut. Her hungry eyes hunted the Child in the darkness. The little brazier, the hut's only proof against the chill, seemed to flee dampered by this spectral appearance. Its flickering flame struggled for life. Let the sea roar, and all that fills it; the world and those who dwell in it! Let the rivers clap their hands; let the hills sing for joy together righteousness, and the peoples with equity. Mary held the Child closer for the chilling presence threatened. Looking upon the intruder, Mary could see, that though she may once long ago have been dazzlingly beautiful, the woman's face was a death's head of crags framed by wild silver hair. Cold and lifeless eyes peering from deep sockets were perched atop a mouth falling down into her face as though fleeing from poisoned fruit. Her sagging skin bore the graying hints of ever-stalking death.

Mary pitied her for she seemed to bear a thousand years of sorrow. May knew in her heart that she had lost a thousand children that she had mothered, seen a thousand cheering armies march away to slaughter, witnessed a thousand proud kings fall, suffered every disappointment, every dashed hope, and every grief that could be borne. A sympathetic tear traced the lily white cheek of the radiant young woman to whom the hope of Israel had come.

Mary's sympathetic reverie was interrupted when she saw the specter move. Her gnarled hand rummaged among her ragged coverings. She was looking for something; something to give the Child. Her hand was clenched as she unsheathed it from her rags. Though what was in her hand was only a shriveled little thing, she lifted it as though upon it balanced the weight of the world. Bending into the dust of the hut and not daring to look up, she knelt before the Child and for a long while she was still. Her clenched hand still extended toward the Child.

After what seemed an earth's age, her shoulders began to shake and Mary heard grief-wracked sobbing emanating from a throat brittle with age. Agonizingly slowly her knotted hand loosened its grip, finger by covetous finger pried from its filthy prize. Now at last she dropped its burden at the feet of the Child.

What she laid there came forth only reluctantly. The thing had fitted into her hand as though it had been gripped there forever. Her tears pattered remorsefully upon this detritus of an age long past, but never forgotten; her weeping damning testimony to the memory of such an age and its powerful impact even unto the present.

Though its burden was crushing, still she desired to possess this ancient artifact; her imagination still enflamed by its horribly enriched, but impossible promise. For that too, she wept at the feet of the child.

What she laid there appeared to be a worm-infested, malformed apple core blackened by much age and handling, though it matters not what fruit it was, as much as the fruit that came from it.

Now the Child who has been fed by Mary upon curds and honey (Is 7:15), reached a tender hand and grasping the repentance-salted core picked up the ancient woman's burden. Not it was no longer hers, but His. What she could bear neither to love nor to give up, He took. What He did not love and did not need to bear, He grasped. And before Mary could stop the Child she watched with horror as He swallowed down the decayed core.

Immediately, His eyes became like burning coals; flames of fire that pierced the dark. Mary could see that his piercing eyes were set upon the face of the crone., whose eyes, formerly cold pits, now reflected the light, which came from the Child's eyes. From the eyes rekindled by the Child a transformation spread over her visage, eyes bright with life shared with the Child, now gave new youth and dissolved decay. Her rags were replaced with royal robes of shining blue. Her head scarf sparkled with seven stars.

She rose, head still inclined in reverence to the Child. She turned to go back into the night, now taller and more lithesome than before, now not ragged but beautifully attired as a bride ready to receive her bridegroom. She turned to leave and looking over her shoulder gave the Child a loving glance, her eyes sparkling with joy at the sight. Mary gasped, for upon seeing the transformed woman's face she realized that the woman looked like her. The woman flashed a dazzling smile at Mary and disappeared into the Judean night.

In the morning, Mary was not sure if she dreamed what she saw. But the neighbors were all astir that day because beautiful flowers and fruitful trees had sprouted up overnight in the town. Where there had only been the brown world of wintry death, the neighbors said that there now seemed to be a little slice of the Garden of Eden all over again. In the deep midwinter, life had returned to their village in full flower. Even the lilies were blooming where they had never been before and the Rose of Sharon sprang to life. Tabor Council Meeting November 7, 2025 **Call to Order** The meeting was called to order with attendance by Orv Quandt, Pastor, Scott Tennant, Janet Strohbusch, Gary Kebschull, John Francis, and James Vorpahl. It was noted that the defibrillator had been checked successfully.

Approval of the Agenda The agenda was approved unanimously with a motion by Scott and second by Janet.

Opening Devotion Pastor led the opening devotion.

Minutes from 10/10/25 for Approval John explained a journal entry from before his appointment that was used to keep records balanced. The minutes were approved unanimously with a motion by Janet and second by Scott.

Treasurer's Report John Francis reported a missing \$2,600 check from October's deposit, which will be realized in November transactions. The report was approved unanimously with a motion by Sonja and second by Gary.

Pastor's Report Pastor noted there were no baptisms or funerals in October. Catechism continues with one student, and all shut-ins were visited. He discussed the upcoming convention and election, suggesting re-election of current officers, with Pam Nelson volunteering as delegate if needed. Advent services will begin the last Sunday in November with the theme "Something Better." The children's program is scheduled for December 14 at Emmanuel. Other announcements included the craft sale on December 6 and Brent Gruetzmacher's presentation on funeral arrangements November 12. The calendar of services is complete. The report was approved unanimously with a motion by Scott and second by Janet.

Old Business Updates included the parsonage plumbing scheduled for November 13, Spectrum services postponed until February due to lawsuits, altar area painting canceled by unanimous vote, and parsonage wall repairs postponed until spring. Pastor confirmed snow removal would be handled with a snow blower rather than plowing at the Parsonage. Snow removal for the church will continue to be source through Spanky's.

Short Term Project List The Toys for Tots box will remain until mid-December. Communion ware was discussed, with no changes needed but possible replacement in the future. Preparations for winter include hooking up an extension cord for the heater and covering pipes with straw, which trustees will complete.

New Business The church website was canceled, with communication shifting to Facebook. James Vorpahl will take over the newsletter in January, while Jane will finish December's edition. A bulletin note will ask members if they prefer email newsletters. Sonja reported daily Facebook posts. James will transfer Egg-

ert's records to the designated church. Derek Beauleau was appointed as payroll processor, with Julia Timm completing records through December. The budget was reviewed and will be finalized in December. Concerns about usher duties and pew cleanup were raised, with Pastor planning a meeting to address them. Membership review will occur in December, with the annual meeting scheduled for January 25, 2026.

Next Council Meeting The next council meeting is scheduled for December 12, 2025, at 4:30 p.m.

<u>Comments and Announcements</u> There were no additional comments or announcements.

Elder on Call Scott will serve as elder on call for December, and Gary will serve in January.

Motion to Adjourn The meeting was adjourned unanimously with a motion by Scott and second by Janet.

Closing Prayer Pastor closed the meeting with prayer.
